"SENIOR RECITAL"

(This skit was written after the recording of a Latin mass and Latin motets. At that time a number of choir members were in school, and final exams were coming up).

CAST: Soprano Une, Soprano Dos, and Amicti Stolis

Soprano Dos: "Oh, really? I just made propter magnum. I only make the no-mi-ne grades."

Soprano Uno: "Well, I made a few a-ahs this semester. I guess that helps."

Soprano Dos: "Have you heard anything about the final exiam George Mims gives in his class?"

Soprano Uno: "Well, all I've heard is that if you don't sing in the right key at your recital he makes you do tusolus instead one."

Soprano Dos: "Yeah, singing for him is always a cru-chi-fix-us experience."

Soprano Uno: "This only my si-cut time to sing for him. I think e-jus supposed to open your mouth wide enough for thri fingers to fit in nicely."

"IN SEARCH OF LIVING WATERS"

(This was a skit performed during the recording of the album, "Sweet Water". It plays on a lot of the comments and lessons Betty Pulkingham made to the choir as she directed the recording).

THEME: FANTASY ISLAND

SCENE: A young woman, "Ginger Ale", is seeking the fountain of youth. She enters the nave from a side door. She walks up to two characters who are spitting consonants into a microphone nearby, Boss and Tatoo.

Ginger: "Hi! I'm Ginger, Ginger Ale. What are you two doing?

Tatoo: "Yes, every consonant must be heard."
